



Me in the Middle


A child-centred approach to help understand how children and young people feel about their relationships with the people around them

Module overview

The child's voice and the voice of the child are common phrases used to describe the 'active' involvement of children and young people by practitioners. Me in Middle has been co-produced by Amity with practitioners from Children's Services to help understand the impact of relationships at home, school, and in the community.

Upon completion, practitioners will take away a practical 70-page Toolkit that covers: key themes from SPRs, legislation, safeguarding, managing disclosure, barriers to disclosure, key questions to ask young people about their lived experience and the impact it has, family relationships and well-being.

The Toolkit includes a range of conversation-provoking illustrated tools to use with children and young people in everyday practice.



The Relationship Toolkit (parental conflict)

Module overview

By the end of the session participants will understand parental conflict and what the research says about its impact family functioning and outcomes for both adults and children.

Recognise that there is a difference between domestic abuse and parental conflict. Feel more confident about 'couple relationship quality enquiry' in their everyday practice.

Participants will become familiar with the with Amity Relationship Toolkit and its contents. Will understand the variety of tools, pre and post-programme selfassessment questionnaire and how to use this within the context of parental conflict support. Confidently assess, plan, implement and review parental conflict support with couples and/or individuals.


Recognising the difference between domestic abuse

Module overview

This extremely popular module is designed for any multi-agency practitioner working with children, adults or families. It's been created in response to questions raised by the wider workforce who are keen to recognise the difference between parental conflict and domestic abuse.

The session explores the language used to describe parental conflict and domestic abuse, understanding coercive control, the critical difference between the two concerns and why sometimes there are behaviour overlaps. We work through the confusion this can cause and what do if a practitioner is concerned about either.
